Aleksandra Cegielska

Painting

Aleksandra, born in 1985 in the small town of Pabianice, Poland, embarked on a journey of discovery by studying International Affairs but quickly realised her passion lay elsewhere. Her life became an affair with the world as she traveled throughout Europe, America, and Asia, eventually settling in Basel, Switzerland.

Aleksandra's travels helped her develop a keen observation of life and a love for different cultures, society standards, and gender equality, which she brings to her paintings. She craves new ways to express these beliefs and has learned to conceptualise and realise non-conforming silhouettes, shapes, and colours. Aleksandra's art explores the human connection and the body and mind, showcasing a fluid concept whereby the two intrinsically connect, with bold colours taking center stage.

The importance of lived experiences in artistic expression is highlighted in her work, as she immerses herself in her surroundings and embraces her own experiences to inspire her creativity. Through observation and experience, Aleksandra gains a deeper understanding of the world and the people within it, which she translates into works of art that inspire and motivate others. Her work invites viewers to engage in an open conversation surrounding topics of the body, sex, and social stereotypes.

She utilises a variety of techniques, including drawing, sculpting, photography, and textile. By embracing her own experiences and drawing inspiration from the world around her, Aleksandra creates works of art that resonate deeply with

Title: There are plenty of fish in the sea **Material:** acrylic on canvas, 50cm x 70cm, 2023 **Description:** In "There are plenty of fish in the sea," artist Aleks playfully reimagines the old saying. The canvas portrays a lively marine scene where fishes take on a charming anthropomorphic quality. Set against a backdrop of serene waves and a sunlit sky, the artwork humorously suggests that the fishes symbolise men in the realm of relationships.

The metaphor gains depth through the artistic depiction, alluding to the abundance of opportunities in the world of romance. The charming scene prompts a smile and encourages viewers to not take the search for love too seriously, as the sea of possibilities is vast. "There are plenty of fish in the sea" encapsulates the essence of the saying while adding a delightful twist, inviting us to contemplate the playful complexities of relationships against the captivating backdrop of the sea.

Title: Szparka 1-3

Material: pastel oil on paper, 50cm x 70cm, 2023 **Description:** The Polish word "szparka" holds a nuanced and evocative meaning within its concise syllables. It encapsulates the essence of a tiny hole or aperture, often suggesting a minuscule opening that leads to something more substantial, mysterious, or unseen.

In the context of the triptych "Szparka," where Aleks paints a black, wavy object resembling a hole against a white backdrop, the word takes on metaphorical significance. This visual representation of a "szparka" becomes a symbol for transition, passage, and the unknown. The waviness of the form might suggest the fluidity of change, while the darkness within may symbolize the enigmatic depths one might encounter on a journey through the "szparka."

Through "Szparka," Aleks orchestrates a visual choreography resonating with flow's essence – an invitation to embrace the present, to be one with undulating forms, and to navigate the currents of artistic expression with a sense of fluidity and resonance.

In 2013, she completed her Foundation Art and Design Course at the Basel School of Design (SfG) and thereafter started a Master of Fine Arts Degree in Graphic Design, at the higher school (HGK) also in Basel. After her studies, she engaged in a diverse number of art projects, working with her teachers and peers. In 2018, she joined the Haus Oslo Ateliers Artists Cooperative from which she created and managed many art exhibitions in the Basel area, with the beginnings of small inter-cultural a project in Delhi, India. The motto that she is working towards is 'Cultivating Culture Inter-culturally' between Basel, India and beyond. She has gained recognition and support from the city of Basel and Atelier Mondial. Rama has had many years of experience as a computer scientist working in larger organisations and made a switch to a less hyper-capitalistic life, running solo and group art exhibitions to represent the views of one and many through her work. She is delighted to represent a multitude of perspectives with the topics that she engages in. Some of her works have been purchased by private collectors and renowned members of society, locally and internationally.

In her projects, she combines her interests in nature, spirituality and yoga, with logic and reasoning. She depicts motifs on smaller and large scales, painting and using different surfaces, reusing and up-cycling materials that exist around her.

She likes the symbolisms of death and rebirth, creation, existence and destruction. She is working with the idea that energy can neither be

created nor destroyed and that it can only change form.

She celebrates figurative and abstract expressions and likes to integrate totality, partiality and nothingness in her works. She enjoys the explorations of systems and subsystems, their inter connectivities, interactions and disconnects. Rama is fascinated by the many possibilities that Advaita Vedanta brings forth.

Sibylle Laubscher

Painting

Sibylle (CH/UK, *1971) seeks to show the numinous, spiritual and beautiful in her work. Her (poetic-expressionistic) style invites you to dialogue with the work.

Laubscher is fascinated by colour (=light), form (=space), movement (=expression) and a sense of play. With these she creates pictures catching the movement of the beautiful and her aesthetic feeling.

Laubscher enjoys delving into other worlds by reading, drawing and painting. She paints to express herself, hide herself in the process of making the work. Since studying textile design (print) at university, her love of the printed image has rekindled. She prints entirely by hand, true to her maxim: "art is made by people for people". Her work explores themes such as being a woman and the environment in an oblique manner, so it remains open, is self-referential and can be interpreted in many ways. It is a living breathing organism that comes alive when you look at it.

Her work is informed by a continuous study of nature and drawing practice to show depth and meaning.

Laubscher firmly believes people need art. Art is a vital form of human expression. It is a lifesustaining force.

She has exhibited widely in group exhibitions throughout Europe, solo exhibitions in Vienna, Austria and Basel, Switzerland. She is a member of the Swiss Society of Female Artists. "Sibylle's work opens up the imagination creating a portal into a world of beauty. She has a uniquely quirky and joyful aesthetic which infuses

Tomoko is a painter and Installation artist, living and working in Chiba, Japan. In 1996 she completed Master's Degree Course, Graduate School of Tama Art University (MFA) and in 2002 she received the 17th Received the 17th Holbein Scholarship Grant. In 2003 she was Selected in the 6th Art Documents Support Program by SHISEIDO, then in 2019 she was an Artist-in- Residence at Atelier Mondial, Basel, Switzerland.

Tomoko has a many year of experience as a painter and a long portfolio of solo, group exhibitions as well and her works being part of public collections and being involved in many other illustrative works.

She creates oil paintings from motifs of nature, such as plants or rivers on huge canvases, or paints on panels which have been cut in the shape of the motif, using these to produce installations within an exhibit space.

She paints plants and rivers, plants symbolise life and rivers symbolise death. They are all connected in the same circle, reincarnation.
